## RANK DESIGNATION CHANGES

Here is an item of news that ought to be on the front page, but we just received word of it late yesterday. Effective immediately, all airmen in pay grade E-4 are to be designated non-commissioned officers, with all of the privileges and responsibilities that adhere thereto. Their grade title is changed to sergeant, and they are to be addressed as such. In addition, the grade designations "second class", and "third class" have been eliminated.

What this means is this: All Airmen First Class are now sergeants, with the title of just plain Sergeant. Those who were Airmen Second Class are now Airmen First Class, and those who were Airmen Thirds are now just plain Airmen. Rank order in the Air Force and Air Reserves, including the ANG is now as follows: Airman Basic (basic training only); Airman; Airman First Class; Sergeant; Staff Sergeant, Tech Sergeant, etc.

Effective the first of this month, all SKTs have gone on a monthly testing schedule. The USAF Supervisory examination is not affected by this change. All units must submit their personnel for SKT testing not later than five working days following the USA before the month the tests are to be administered. Airmen being considered for an AFS for which a test does not exist will meet with the personnel classification board in lieu of testing.

## AIRCREW'S BETTER PROTECTED

Air Force crewmen flying in Southeast Asia are now wearing a new type of body armor and special helmets as protection against enemy ground fire.

This protective armor decreases the vulnerability of aircrews to small arms ground fire during rescue defoliation and ground support missions. Both body armor and protective helmets are being used by crewmen in C-123 and C-130 aircraft and HH-3E "Jolly Green Giant" helicopters.

The body armor which covers the back and chest is made of a ceramic material backed with nylon to prevent pieces from flying off struck by small arms fragments.
